**YOUR NEW RECYCLING DAY IS:**

Please **do not** put your recycling out on your trash day or trash out on recycling day – it will not be collected. Residents living on Tuckaway Trail, Saint Andrews Drive and Royal Berkshire Circle will have their trash collection day changed to better balance our collection system. Your new trash day will be on Friday. Your new recycling day will be on Thursday.

## COMING TO YOUR HOME THIS FALL: A New Toter for Recycling

As part of the Township's new single stream recycling program, each residential household will receive a new toter with a yellow lid to be used solely for recyclables. The new toter will be delivered during the week of September 20th. The first collection using the new system will begin the week of September 27th.

SINGLE STREAM RECYCLING IS THE PLACEMENT OF ALL RECYCLABLE ITEMS TOGETHER in the same container for pickup by the Township. All items – newsprint, junk mail, aluminum and bi-metal cans, plastics #1 through #7, glass bottles (all colors), and corrugated cardboard will be placed in this toter with the yellow lid. Your current toter will continue to be used for trash/refuse

collection. Your recycling pickup will be on a different day than your trash/refuse pickup. Please see the schedule to the left. Because your pickup days are consecutive, you will be able to retrieve one toter when you take the other to the curb. Your trash toter and recycling toter must be placed at the curb by 6:00am on collection days. Large item pickup

## New Recycling Toter [CONTINUED FROM COVER]

continues to be on your last trash pickup day of the month.

Single Stream Recycling will allow

you to put corrugated cardboard at curbside. Cardboard must be ripped or cut to fit loosely in the toter. Separation of recyclables is no longer necessary. If you do not have a lot of material for recycling you will not have to put it out for collection each week. Do

not recycle any type of plastic bags in the toter as they will jam the processing facility's equipment.


The new toters include an electronic chip which will be used to register them to each dwelling unit and to track usage and assist when there is a violation.

Recycling is required by Municipal and State law. Recyclable material cannot be placed in trash toters and trash cannot

be placed in recycling toters. As required by law, citations will be issued for non compliance.

You may keep your present recycling bin for other purposes or place it in your recycling toter to be recycled.

## Sewer Grinder Pump Troubleshooting

This summer we have received a number of service calls for grinder pump issues, especially after lightning storms. Storm surges may trip the circuit breaker in your home's electrical panel that controls the operation of your pump – even when your lights or other circuits don't go out.

When your pump's circuit breaker is off, waste is not pumped into the collection line at the curb. This will result in a backup in your plumbing. To be cautious, please check your sewer pump circuit breaker whenever you visit your electrical panel or after a particularly nasty lightning storm. An ounce of prevention can save you a messy clean up. 🍷

## The Township's Bond Rating Increases

This past spring, Moody's Investors Service, which is a respected and widely utilized source for credit ratings, increased the Township's bond/credit rating by two levels to "Aa3." This rating falls within the 2nd highest category of bond, just below the "triple A" rating. This change is a reflection of the Township's fiscal health and sound financial practices over the years. Our rating allows the Township to achieve lower interest rates on any future bond issue and not purchase any bond insurance for future issues. 🍷

# Keystone Collections to Replace Berkheimer for Earned Income Tax Collection

Beginning in 2011, all Chester County municipalities and school districts will have a single earned income tax collector.

THE STATE PASSED THE EARNED INCOME TAX COLLECTION CONSOLIDATION ACT (ACT 32) IN 2008. It consolidates collections by County; requiring uniform withholding, remittance, distribution and reporting. Act 32 also establishes uniform statewide rules and regulations and provides for accountability, oversight, and enforcement of the system.

In September 2009, appointed representatives from each municipality and school district formed the Chester Tax Collection Committee. This group analyzed the needs of the municipalities and school districts and then determined how best to implement the new tax regulations in the county.

In August of 2010, after reviewing the tax collection rates and capabilities of private tax collection firms, the Committee voted to appoint Keystone Collections Group ([www.keystonecollects.com](http://www.keystonecollects.com)) as the new, earned income tax collector for Chester County. The new collection commission rate of 1.4% is lower than the previous rate of 1.5%. This is expected to save the School District over \$12,000 and the Township over \$7,000 per year in fees.

The transition from Berkheimer Associates, the current collector for the Township and Downingtown Area School District, is underway. Your earned income tax rate of 1% will not change and will continue to be split between the School

## DID YOU KNOW [ANSWER]

Gibson's Covered Bridge, along Downingtown Pike, is located half in West Bradford Township and half in East Bradford Township. Owned by the County of Chester; it was built in 1872 at a cost of \$2,600. It was last restored after being extensively damaged by Hurricane Floyd in 1999.

District and Township. The new tax collector will be contacting all businesses in the County to inform them of the change and any new collection processes. As a resident, you will have to file your tax return with a different collector, but much of the process should stay the same. All filings after January 1, 2011 will be made to Keystone Collections Group.

## Start Shopping for Electricity Now

You have probably heard by now that PECO's electrical rate caps are due to expire on December 31, 2010. It is very likely that our electric rates will increase in 2011. This electrical deregulation process was mandated by the State in the 1990's and the transition period is ending.

### IMPORTANT FACTS ABOUT PA ELECTRIC DEREGULATION:

- You can now shop around for electrical providers;
- If you don't shop, PECO will become your default provider and their cost may not be the lowest;
- Your electric bill is split into three categories - generation cost (variable), distribution cost (fixed), and transmission cost (fixed);
- There used to be only one variable on how much your electricity cost -how much you used. Now there are two - how much you use and how much it

costs your generator to produce it;

- Electricity prices used to be fixed for long periods. That will change. Electricity is now going to be priced the same way gasoline is - with daily changes. But, by choosing the right provider and program for you, you can minimize the changes and get a good price.

You should start shopping now.

**HOLIDAY REFUSE & RECYCLING PICK-UP**

Please remember that when your regular refuse and recycling collection day falls on a holiday, your holiday collection day will be the Wednesday of the week that has the holiday. Even if the holiday occurs on a Thursday or Friday, your collection day will be Wednesday. If you miss the holiday pickup you will have to wait until your regular collection day on the following week. Below is a handy reminder of the upcoming holidays and their corresponding collection days.

- Thanksgiving** (Thursday 11/25) collected → Wednesday 11/24
- Christmas Eve** (Friday 12/24) collected → Wednesday 12/22

# Fish Really Do Grow on Trees

*That is, they need trees to grow!*

Trees along a stream bank maintain the health of the stream and the fish population in it and become a forested riparian zone.

**THE FORESTED RIPARIAN BUFFER:**

- Helps to maintain the stream bank. The root systems of large woody plants keep the bank from eroding. Eroding banks clog streams with sediment.
- Prevents pollution of the stream by lawn fertilizers or run-off from roads.
- Supplies food for many of the critters that live in the stream, including fish.
- Shades the stream, allowing fish, such as trout who need cold water, to survive.
- Improves wildlife habitat.
- Provides a natural corridor for wildlife.
- Enhances water quality.

*~ Buffer Fact ~*  
The forested riparian buffer shades the stream, allowing fish, such as trout who need cold water, to survive.



If you have a stream side area on your property, please try to maintain it as a buffer. Remove only invasive species and replace them with natives. A healthy stream system is dependent on your help. The Township has added a requirement in its Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance making sure that these buffers are saved or replanted when development occurs. 🍃

**HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS  
WASTE COLLECTION**

West Bradford Township participates in the Regional Southeastern PA Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program. This means you can take your residential household hazardous waste and discarded electronics equipment to any regional collection event. **This year's last collection day in the County is being held from 9am–3pm on Saturday, October 9th** at Government Services Center 601 Westtown Road, West Chester. (HHW & Computers)

Details on these events, and others in the region, may be found on the Chester County Solid Waste Authority's website ([www.chestercountyswa.org](http://www.chestercountyswa.org)). Please review the list for the items accepted. The Lanchester Landfill also accepts computers at its small load facility for a small fee year-round. The Authority has also launched a new program for old asphalt shingles. West Bradford Township does not collect shingles and other construction debris in our regular trash pick-up. Residents may drop off old asphalt shingles at the Lanchester Landfill for a reduced fee of \$35 per ton (a significant discount off the regular rate of \$72 per ton).

All pickups must be scheduled by calling or e-mailing the Township office at (610) 269-4174 or [receptionist@westbradford.org](mailto:receptionist@westbradford.org). Your bags must be out by 6:00am on the scheduled dates. Leaves must be

placed in special biodegradable (paper) bags. Bags may be purchased at the Township Administration Building, 1385 Campus Drive, during regular business hours (Monday through Friday, 8:00am–4:30pm). Bags are provided to residents at cost, 2 bags for \$1. The fees for the actual collection are already factored into your refuse and recycling bill.

Do not use your toter, recycling bins, or any other type of bag or container. Leaves in other non-compostable paper bags, containers, or your toter will not be collected. Brush must be tied into bundles with cotton or hemp twine and cannot be more than 4' long or have branches greater than 4" in diameter. To avoid damaging the equipment used to compost

the vegetation, the leaves and brush need to be free of plastic, trash and other debris.

You may compost your yard waste yourself instead of placing it out for pick up. We encourage all of our residents to compost or mulch their yard waste if they can. This reduces the amount of waste that has to be collected and helps the environment. Yard waste includes leaves, clippings, grass cuttings, and even food and vegetable scraps and coffee grounds. Compost can be used as fertilizer and mulch around your yard. # Developing a Wilder Aesthetic

## Converting Lawn to Meadow for Better Bird Habitat

French aristocrats popularized the idea of the green, grassy lawn in the 18th century when they planted the agricultural fields around their estates with turf. The message was clear: they had more land than they needed and could afford to waste some.

TODAY, AMERICANS SPEND APPROXIMATELY \$30 BILLION EVERY YEAR to maintain over 23 million acres of lawn. Lawns in the U.S. consume around 270 billion gallons of water a week. And American homeowners apply 10 times more fertilizer, herbicides, and pesticides to their grass than farmers do to their crops, which results in chemically dependent lawns that negatively affect the health of people, pets, plants and wildlife. Through our Center for Conservation Landowners, we work with homeowners interested in adopting a more ecologically savvy and cost-saving approach to lawn care. Simple changes – such as applying fertilizer at the right time of year, replacing chemical herbicides with natural corn gluten meal, and setting mower blades higher for longer grass – make a big difference. But how about taking things a step further? Consider converting a portion of your lawn to meadow in an effort to reduce the need for watering, mowing, or chemical treatments and to create an ideal habitat for native bird and butterfly species.

Over the last century, changes in agricultural technology – combined with a loss of farmland to development – have caused a decline in the quantity and quality of grasslands for wildlife. Old hayfields, traditionally harvested late in the season, provided ideal breeding habitat for many birds. Today, our remaining hayfields are fewer in number and usually mowed earlier. These changes have threatened the survival of bird species dependent on large

(25 acres-plus) areas of grasslands and meadows, such as Bobolink, Eastern Meadowlark, Grasshopper Sparrow and Upland Sandpiper.

While most homeowners are unable to create the size habitat necessary to support a breeding population of these

species of concern, there are many benefits to converting even a portion of your lawn to meadow. Species such as American Goldfinch, Field Sparrow, Eastern Bluebird, Eastern Phoebe and Eastern Kingbird occupy smaller grasslands. These areas

may also support unusual migratory grassland birds as a stopover in their search for suitable breeding locations.


An easy way to get started is to mow a portion of your lawn only once or twice a year. You may be amazed by how beautiful your cool-season turf grasses are at full maturity. The cool-season grasses will die back in June, but be rejuvenated by fall with the return of cooler weather. The grasses can be augmented with wildflowers and native grasses to give the meadow color, diversity, and visual interest. Wildflowers in particular attract insects that are an important component of birds' diet. They also provide nutritious seeds for birds, and serve as nectar and breeding host plants for butterflies.

You also can plant native warm-season grasses, which grow during the heat of summer, among the turf grasses and wildflowers. Smaller species, such as little bluestem and broom sedge, as well as taller species, like big bluestem and Indian grass, are upright in habit and have clump bases that provide protective cover for nesting. They also boast beautiful golden fall color and structural winter interest.

To maintain your meadow, it must be cut once or twice a year, and timing is everything! While mowing in the spring might appease suburban sensibilities, most meadow wildlife is nesting at this time of year. And mowing mid-summer to mid-fall does not allow enough time for the vegetation to renew itself until the following spring, leaving little cover. Avoid mowing in the two periods between April Fools Day and Flag Day (April 1 to June 14), and Independence Day to Halloween (July 4 to October 31).

The ideal time to mow is between March 1 and April 15.

Once your meadow is established, it will require little watering or maintenance, which will save you time and money. Herbaceous weeds can be hand-pulled and seasonal mowings will thwart woody invaders. When the neighbors ask

where the lawn has gone, tell them you adopted a wilder aesthetic... then sit back and watch the butterflies and birds flock to your backyard slice of heaven.
