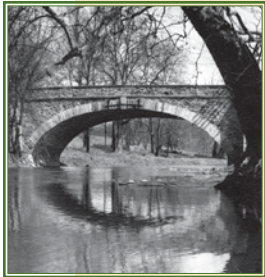

## HISTORIC COPES BRIDGE TO BE REBUILT



The historic stone arch Copes Bridge in East Bradford on West Strasburg Road has been slated to be rebuilt starting this fall.



The PennDot project has been awarded to J.D. Eckman, Inc. Certain portions of the structure will be disassembled and rebuilt using the existing

stone. The center core of the bridge will be strengthened and new pavement added. The top walls of the bridge will be constructed of concrete, with the original stone being sliced and used as facing on the walls. The work was expected to be completed by the end of November 2010. However, it appears that there may be a delay in starting the project, which will extend the completion time.

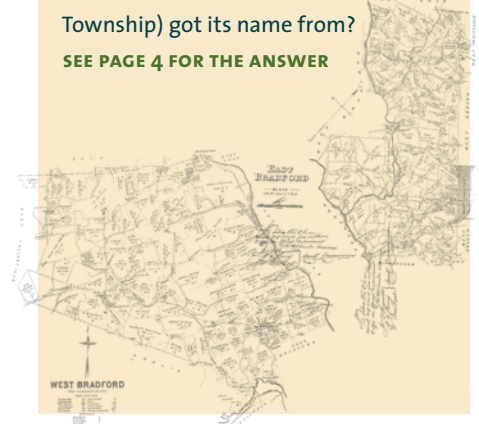

### Intersection “Stop Bars”

Many street intersections contain a white stripe known as a “stop bar.” That bar is perpendicular to the side of the road and is 24 inches wide. The stop bar usually is located at the same location as the stop sign.

When approaching an intersection with a stop sign and stop bar, you must stop at the stop bar before slowly moving forward to view any oncoming traffic. Failure to stop at the stop bar can result in a traffic violation for failure to stop at the intersection. When approaching a signalized intersection, you must stop at the stop bar and not beyond that bar. When stopping beyond the stop bar at a signalized intersection your vehicle will be in the traveling or turning lane of other vehicles. 🍃

### Call Before You Dig is Now 811

Pennsylvania law requires that homeowners, contractors and businesses notify utilities in advance before digging around utilities. Pennsylvania’s One Call system was established in 1972. It is free to homeowners and requires a minimum of three days notice before any excavation takes place. Local utilities will then respond within that time and mark out all utilities near your excavation.

## CURBSIDE YARD WASTE COLLECTION: Schedule Your Pickup

WEST BRADFORD TOWNSHIP IS PLEASED TO CONTINUE ITS CURBSIDE YARD WASTE COLLECTION PROGRAM FOR SHRUBBERY AND TREE TRIMMINGS.

Residents must call or e-mail the Township to schedule these collections. There is no additional charge for residential customers, as the cost of the service is included in your base refuse bill.



### THE FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS MUST BE MET TO RECEIVE THIS SERVICE:

- **Shrubbery and trimmings must be less than four inches in diameter.**
- **Shrubbery and trimmings must be equal or less than four feet in length.**
- **Shrubbery and trimmings must be bundled, using hemp or other biodegradable twine, into bundles**


**of less than 12 inches in diameter or placed in compostable collection bags.**

Collection will only be provided by appointment. It won't be collected unless

you call the Township to schedule. The Township has the right to limit the amount of shrubbery collected per household.

In addition to the collection service by appointment, the Chester County Solid Waste Authority offers a drop-

off facility at the Lanchester Landfill. Hours are Monday through Friday from 7am– 4:30pm and Saturday from 7am – 11:30am. Call the landfill at (610) 273-3771 for more details.

The Township accepts Christmas Trees from December through January at the Municipal Campus – other yard waste is not accepted.

## FALL CURBSIDE LEAF COLLECTION: Schedule Your Pickup

THIS YEAR'S LEAF COLLECTION DATES WILL BE ON WEDNESDAYS. FOUR PICK-UPS ARE PLANNED FOR TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS ONLY.

### LEAF BAGS AND TIED BRUSH WILL BE PICKED UP CURBSIDE ON THE FOLLOWING DATES:

**Wednesday, October 21**  
**Wednesday, November 4**  
**Wednesday, November 18**  
**Wednesday, December 9**



This year all pickups must be scheduled before hand by calling or e-mailing the Township office at (610) 269-4174 or [recpl@westbradford.org](mailto:recpl@westbradford.org).

Your bags must be out by 6:00am

on the scheduled dates. Leaves must be placed in special biodegradable (paper) bags. Bags may be purchased at the Township Administration Building, 1385 Campus Drive, during regular business hours - Monday through Friday - 8:00am – 4:30pm.


Bags are provided to residents at cost, 2 bags for \$1. The fees for the actual collection are already factored into your refuse and recycling bill.

Leaves will be picked up only in biodegradable paper leaf bags. Do not use your toter, recycling bins, or any other type of bag or container. Leaves in other non-compostable bags, containers, or your toter will not be collected.

To avoid damaging the equipment used

to compost the leaves, the leaves need to be free of plastic, trash, and other debris.

You may compost your yard waste yourself instead of placing it out for pickup. We encourage all of our residents to compost or mulch their yard waste if they can. This reduces the amount of waste that has to be collected and helps the environment. Yard waste includes leaves, clippings, grass cuttings, and even food and vegetable scraps and coffee grounds. Compost can be used as fertilizer and mulch around your yard.

## Township Yard Waste Drop-Off Site to Open This Fall

The Township is establishing a yard waste composting site for residents this fall. The site will be at 2020 West Strasburg Road between the intersections of Lone Eagle Road and Persimmon Drive.

YARD WASTE, TREE BRANCHES, AND CLEAN LUMBER WILL BE ACCEPTED AT THE SITE AND USED FOR LANDSCAPE MULCH. Initially, the tree waste material and clean lumber will be removed by a mulch processor for grinding. Leaf waste will be composted on site and turned into leaf compost / soil amendments.

The curbside collections of leaves and yard waste scheduled for October 21st, November 4th, November 18th and December 9th will occur in addition to operation of the drop-off site. This drop-off site will provide an additional opportunity for residents to dispose of yard waste and leaves. Leaves must be in biodegradable paper bags or in a covered vehicle to be dropped-off.

Clean lumber is used lumber that has not been used for cement forms, is not treated lumber and contains no demolition wastes. Lumber containing nails and pallets are accepted. This will be ground for mulch and the metal removed during the grinding process.

A minimal fee will be charged to offset the costs of the attendant and site operation. Please check the Township web site for the opening details, days / times of operation, and instructions for use. The site will have an attendant on duty when it is open.

# What's in a Name?

## Bradford Township, Chester County

Bradford Township, created in 1705, was one of the first Townships formed after William Penn established Pennsylvania's first three Counties – Chester, Philadelphia, and Bucks. It was believed to be named either after a village in Yorkshire, England or the town of Bradford-on-Avon in Wiltshire.

IT WAS POISED FOR EARLY DEVELOPMENT BECAUSE OF ITS LANDSCAPE OF LUSH MEADOWLAND, STRONG WATER POWER, AND ABUNDANT TIMBER. The first settlers, or “first purchasers,” as they were known, were

investors who were granted large tracts of land over 1,000 acres and were given the ability to divide the land into smaller parcels and sell it. Under Penn's conditions, the first settlers must “plant a family” within three years on each tract. Twenty-three “freemen” appeared on the first tax records in 1715.

The Township grew steadily and was divided into East and West Bradford Townships in 1731. At the first U.S. Census in 1790, East Bradford had a population of 836 and West Bradford had 725.

Among the townships in Chester County, East and West Bradford are among the few with significant connections to the local Native Americans known as the Lenni Lenape. Partly because of their location between the two branches of the Brandywine Creek, the Townships had an early history with a tribe of Lenape that had grown numerous by the 1680's. This tribe was known as the “Brandywine

Indians” by the English. Their name for the Brandywine was the Wawassan. It might sound familiar if you've ever been in a Wawa store, the brand name came from the Lenape language. One early and rare description of the landscape comes

from a German naturalist who was visiting in 1748 and observed, “The greater part of the country is covered with several kinds of deciduous trees; for I scarcely saw a single tree of the fir kind...except for a few red cedars.

The forest was high, but open below so that it left a free prospect to the eye.”

Over the years, a number of notable visitors

to West Bradford Township have left a mark on history. Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon, of Mason-Dixon line fame, stayed at an inn in the Township while completing their initial calculations at a place now known as the Stargazer's Stone. In September of 1777, the Township was visited by some 12,000 Redcoats who crossed the Brandywine at Trimble's Ford to flank General Washington's army during the Battle of the Brandywine. Charles Lindbergh, the first person to fly across the Atlantic, had an impromptu overnight visit in 1928 when the plane he was flying ran into fog and landed in a farmer's field. ✍

## DISPOSAL OF SWIMMING POOL WATER WINTERIZE YOUR POOL

**Summer is over! It's time to winterize your pool.** The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection would like to remind you that the disposal of swimming pool water into a stream or stormwater inlet is a violation of the Pennsylvania Clean Streams Law.

### USE THESE GUIDELINES WHEN WINTERIZING YOUR POOL:

- Water should be pumped over a grassy area to allow absorption, filtration, and aeration of water. The discharge should be at a rate which prevents erosion and optimizes filtration.
- Standing water or accumulated rain and/or pool water from the previous season should be pumped from the top so as not to disturb settled solids. Solids on the pool bottom should not be discharged. Following pump down of water, solids should be cleaned out manually. Water pH should be between 6 and 9 standard units and total chlorine residual should be 0.0 mg/l.
- Cleaning wastewaters containing muriatic acid or chlorine that is used in cleaning pool surfaces needs to be treated prior to discharge. Muriatic acid wastewater should be neutralized to a pH between 6 and 9 standard units. Chlorine rinses should stand for a period of days to allow chlorine degradation prior to discharge.
- Filter backwash water during normal pool operation must be at a sufficiently low volume that all water infiltrates to the ground.

## Just Say No!

To comply with state laws, Township Supervisors sometimes have to make unpopular decisions.

WAL-MART is coming to town and wants to build its new store near your neighborhood. *The township supervisors should just say no.*

A PIG FARMER wants to set up shop down the road from your new dream home. *The township supervisors should just say no.*

A LOCAL BUSINESSMAN wants to open an adult bookstore a few doors away from your church. *The township supervisors should just say no.*

It's that easy, right? Well, not really.

When making land use decisions, township supervisors must comply with a handful of state laws, including the granddaddy of them all, the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code, which was enacted in 1968 to guide local officials as they develop their communities.

And while the MPC, the courts, and the legislature have given township supervisors a certain amount of latitude and flexibility in making local land use decisions, they have been very firm about one thing: Townships with zoning ordinances must allow for every use.

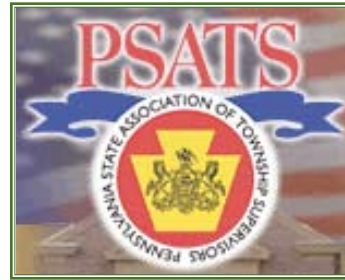
In other words, townships must set aside land for such necessary things as homes and businesses and such controversial things as landfills and cell phone towers. And no matter how much residents may protest, township supervisors have very few options when faced with an unpopular use: If the applicant complies with state and local laws, the township must allow it.

"Township residents may not want an adult bookstore or a hog farm in their community, but the courts have

determined that these are legitimate uses," says Elam Herr, Assistant Executive Director of the Pennsylvania State Association of Township

Supervisors. "So unless a township wants to wind up in court, spending valuable tax dollars because it sidestepped a state law, it can't ban or say no to these businesses. The supervisors' hands are tied.

"Sometimes, that's difficult for residents to understand," he adds, "but townships must follow state and federal laws like anyone else or face the consequences." ✍



## HISTORIC COPES BRIDGE [CNTD FROM COVER]

When the bridge is completed it will look much as it does presently, but will have the strength to carry the traffic load of Rt. 162 and better withstand damage from accidents that may occur within the bridge.

There have been many attempts to replace or repair the bridge in a different fashion, but with its historic significance it has been determined that the present project would be best suited to accomplish the needs of a busy roadway, as well as preserve the historical appearance.

In West Bradford Township, West Strasburg Road (Route 162) will be detoured from Marshallton on Sugarsbridge Road and turned east on Rt. 322 to Creek Road.
