## A Letter from the Township Manager

Dear Residents,

As you sit back in your lawn chair sipping your summer drink of choice, reading your favorite newsletter, here are a couple brief highlights to catch you up with what's going on at West Bradford.

First, please join us in congratulating our long-time receptionist, Ms. Patty Murdoch on her upcoming retirement. If you called or visited West Bradford over the past 17 years, you have had the privilege of interacting with Patty. We will certainly miss having her at West Bradford, but we wish her the best of health and happiness in her retirement. Please join us in welcoming Ms. Paige Tomczak who will be taking the place of Patty. We are confident you will find Ms. Tomczak to be a welcoming personality in our front office.



Fortunately, the days of the pandemic are in the rearview mirror. As many of you are aware, the Federal Government distributed COVID Relief funds to municipalities across the Country. West Bradford received approximately \$1.4 million of that funding. You might ask, where did West Bradford invest our funds? Most of the funding has been allocated to our aging

sewer infrastructure. Coupled with funds collected from developers, the Township will invest nearly \$3 million dollars into revitalizing our wastewater treatment facilities. This investment will rejuvenate and modernize our sewer infrastructure, adding substantial years to the operating life while reducing the direct burden to our residents. The Township also invested funding to upgrade our energy efficient geothermal heating and cooling system in our Township Building. Lastly, we set aside funds to rehabilitate and improve our storm sewer infrastructure located within Township roadways.

In previous newsletters we highlighted different land preservation efforts the Township was pursuing. It seems appropriate that we take account of where we stand four years post

the launch of our land preservation efforts. Our first official easement was executed in January of 2019. In the four years that followed, the Township was successful in securing over 800 acres of land for permanent conservation. While that sounds considerable, there is much more work to be done and rest assured, the Township is going to continue with the same zeal we began with in 2019. We cannot forget the true thrust behind our ability to complete these projects, the landowner, and the taxpayer. These easements are all entered into on a voluntary basis, which would be impossible without the buy-in from the property owner. Without the support of you, the taxpayer, there would be no funds to make these projects a reality. To everyone who plays a critical role in preserving our iconic Township, **THANK YOU!**

### WEDNESDAY IS HOLIDAY COLLECTION DAY

If a regularly-scheduled refuse, recycling or large item collection day falls on a holiday, collection for that day will be rescheduled for the Wednesday of the holiday week. Your Tuesday collection will remain on the scheduled day.



West Bradford Township is excited to offer residents easy and convenient methods to pay their utility bills.

### NO FEES:

- **Mail or bring a check** to the Township Building (1385 Campus Drive, Downingtown, PA 19335).
- **Online** bill pay through your bank (make sure to reference your 10 digit account number).
- **Go to TD Bank** at 3821 W Lincoln Highway, Downingtown, PA 19335 (only this branch) and bring your payment stub and check.
- **Set up automatic payments.** You can do this by going to our website to download the form. - Call the Township or go to the Township Building and pay by **credit card (there is a 2.50% fee)**.
- You may also make a payment by phone or check your account balance 24/7 with our automated phone service. Call (844) 810-7245 or make a payment by going to our website [westbradford.org](http://westbradford.org) and click Online Payments. There is a per transaction limit of \$300.00.
- A service fee of \$4.50 will be applied to all credit card payments and a fee of \$1.50 will be applied to all payments made via electronic check (ACH/EFT).



## West Bradford Fire Company

The West Bradford Fire Co would like to remind everyone of some safety items. We have recently responded to several incidents within the township and have noticed some safety items within the community.

Please make sure your house and or mailbox is marked with your address, three-to-four-inch reflective numbers are ideal and both sides of your mailbox should be marked, so that it is visible from either direction of travel. This helps responders locate your property in a timely manner.

Smoke / Carbon Monoxide detectors that have been removed from the mounting surface and not replaced, smoke / CO detectors without batteries and smoke / CO detectors that are older than 10 years old. These devices could save your life and provide valuable time for your family to escape should you have a fire or Carbon Monoxide incident. Smoke detectors have a life expectancy of five to ten years depending on the manufacturer. Most smoke / CO detectors are labeled with an expiration / replacement date or a manufactured date. Please follow the directions on these devices, and if your device does not have a label, it is most likely older than ten years old and should be replaced.



The last item is, consider all downed power lines or wires to be electrified or carrying electricity. Please notify 911 and PECO of wires down and keep your distance from the wires and anything that the wires may be touching as electricity can travel up to several hundred feet on certain items, such as guiderail, trees, fencing and other materials that act as conductors and allow electricity to travel through them. 🐸

# Turn out the Lights, Please

Maybe when you were growing up you heard, “Did you turn the lights out?” when you left a room. Back then, it was a means to teach energy – and financial – conservation. Let’s all extend this lesson to conserve our state insect, the firefly or “lightening bug.”

Over 169 species of fireflies inhabit the U.S. and Canada. In addition to providing a lightshow, fireflies are important to the ecosystem. They function as both predator and prey, maintain population balance, and loosen the soil, which helps with oxygen, water and sunlight penetration.

The bad news is that a national study showed the firefly population declining, with light pollution determined to be a top threat that fireflies face, in addition to loss of habitat and pesticide use. Sources of light pollution include streetlights, yard lighting, headlights, billboards, and lighting from businesses. The effects of “artificial light at night” or “ALAN” on fireflies include decreased ability to successfully reproduce, difficulty with navigation, reduced night vision, and increased risk of predation.

## HOW CAN WE PRESERVE FIREFLIES FOR OUR CHILDREN’S AND GRANDCHILDREN’S SUMMER FUN?

- Turn out lights you aren’t using
- Remove lights that only serve a cosmetic purpose, such as tree and façade lights
- Install motion-activated lights
- Installing timers to turn off lights after bedtime



## REMEMBER THE “FLUSHABLE FOUR!”

If your property has a grinder pump, only four kinds of materials are permitted to be discharged into the sanitary sewer system...

1. Human waste & toilet paper;
2. Food wastes processed through a garbage disposal unit (but not grease);
3. Water from sinks, tubs & dishwashers; and,
4. Water from washing machines.

All other materials can damage your grinder pump, and this includes all varieties of adult and baby wipes. Property owners are responsible for any damages caused by the discharge of prohibited materials.


## ROAD WORK

The Township appreciates your patience as we work to improve our roads and keep our community a wonderful place to live. This Summer/Fall the Township plans on paving or repairing portions of the following roads: Broad Run Rd. (W. Strasburg Rd. to Clayton Rd.), Broad Run Rd. (Clayton Rd. to Northbrook Rd.) Broad Run Rd. (Chestnut Ln. to Beacon Hill Rd.), Old Shadyside Rd. (Route 322 to Shadyside Rd.), Stouff Road (West Chester Rd. to Twp. Line), Telegraph Rd. (Scattergood Ln. to Twp. Line), Waltz Rd. (2000' Section from Telegraph Rd.), Warpath Rd. (From Broad Run Rd. to Twp. Line).

There will be occasional delays on these roads during work hours and there may be temporary road closures for non-emergency vehicles. Residents living on these roads will be notified in advance of the work.

# Paper is a Lovable Recyclable

When you talk about recycling, it's likely that plastic is the material on everyone's minds. "Plastic is confusing!" (Yes, it is!) "Do we really need it?" (Yes and no)

But paper? Not so much. Why not? Because paper is one of the easiest materials to recycle, and it has a long history of recyclability in the US (1600's by many accounts). Recycling one ton of paper saves 3.3 cubic yards of our precious landfill space!<sup>1</sup>

Paper can be recycled 5-7 times. The longer the paper's fibers, the more times it can be recycled into a new product before it loses its integrity. Today's copy paper can be next week's newspaper, then next month's paper towels.

Using recovered paper in mills is more economical than using virgin fiber. The process does not require extreme heat for melting, as it does for plastic, glass, and metals. Energy costs are a concern, however most of the mills in our eastern region have very efficient systems. Philadelphia's Newman Mill, for example, has a closed loop system that co-generates, producing its own steam and electricity. Using 100% recycled feedstock, Newman Paper manufactures chip board used in the making of packaging, gameboards, puzzles, candy boxes, book covers and many other everyday products.

About 80% of US paper mills depend on used paper to manufacture some or all their products.<sup>1</sup> Overall, the fiber mill industry is healthy, there is plenty of recyclable fiber feedstock available and trucking and labor are finally finding some stabilization.

## WHAT PAPER IS ACCEPTABLE IN RECYCLING BINS?

Clean loads are essential! Unsoiled junk mail, magazines, newspaper, office paper, flattened cereal boxes/paperboard and corrugated, and CLEAN pizza boxes (NO FOOD OR GREASE!).

Not all paper collected for recycling in Chester County ends up at the same mill. Each has their own unique limits on what specific fibers they need and contamination levels. **Always check with your municipality or private recycling hauler to know what is acceptable.**

Let's be Trash Smart. Appreciate your paper when you use it and love it enough to easily recycle it!
