# A Letter from the Township Manager

Dear Residents,

I hope this newsletter finds you and your family enjoying the spring and summer season. It's hard to believe we are halfway through 2022 already. You know what they say, "time flies..." well, you fill in the blank!

We'll kick this newsletter off with a brief highlight of recent happenings in West Bradford.

In a previous letter, we highlighted our effort to acquire a farm on Groundhog College Road. The farm was originally eyed for development. Through a three-year effort, we were able to purchase 108 acres of the farm from the former owner. The township paid \$27,500.00 per acre for a total price of \$2,970,000.00. We subdivided the property into two large parcels and placed conservation easements on both. The parcels were then listed for sale on the market. We recently sold one parcel for \$1,060,000.00. The second parcel also sold for \$1,200,000.00. Our goal was to recuperate the majority of our initial investment which will achieve our goal of open space conservation at a substantially reduced cost.

Why stop at 108 acres? The Township is also in the process of closing a 114 acre easement on a farm on Northbrook Road. We were fortunate to receive a \$1,000,000.00 grant from Chester County toward that preservation effort. The Township will match that with approximately \$1,600,000.00 in open space funds to accomplish the preservation.

We're also happy to announce that the Township was able to reach a deal with the owner of Tarad Hill (1451 Camp Linden Road) which will allow the entire 134 acre farm to be preserved.

We have several other land preservation projects in the pipeline which we are actively negotiating for easements. I look forward to sharing those details with you as we get closer to putting ink on paper. The Board of Supervisors and staff along with the support of our Open Space Committee remain fully committed to preserving as much of our iconic landscape as possible.

Speaking of preservation, what is the status of the 200+ acre Embreeville site? I knew you would ask! The Township recently kicked off the master planning process for the Embreeville site. This planning will likely take 12 - 18 months and will give us a blueprint on how the site will be utilized as well as a guide to start seeking additional outside funding for the implementation of passive and active recreation amenities.

If you visited our municipal campus lately, you probably noticed construction is complete and we are settling in to the new facility. If you haven't visited us yet, we recently filled the candy tray in the lobby so please stop by!

On the personnel front, we are excited to introduce two new employees that joined our team in May. Please join us in welcoming Mr. Joseph Antonelli, who joins us from Limerick Township, Montgomery County. Mr. Antonelli has filled the position of Planning and Zoning Director. Also we welcome Mr. Jason Dubiel, who joins us from Manheim Township, Lancaster County. Mr. Dubiel has assumed the position of Finance Director. Our current Finance Director, Rosemary Moore, is retiring after years of distinguished service and we wish her a very happy and healthy retirement.

#### **ROAD WORK**


The Township sincerely appreciates your patience as we work to improve our roads and keep our community a great place to live.

Broad Run Rd. (Tuckaway Trail to W. Strasburg), Chestnut Lane (Oakwood to Romansville), Spellman Drive, Hilltop Road, Oakwood Road, Hall Road (Marshallton Thorndale to Hall Lane), Buckingham Drive, Westminster Drive, Wyndham Drive.

There will be occasional delays on these roads during work hours, and at certain times sections of each road may be closed to all non-emergency vehicles. Residents living on these roads will be notified in advance of the work, and the Township will provide detailed information on any required road closures.

#### **GIBSON BRIDGE**

Recently Gibson Bridge was reopened after sustaining due to damages from the flooding caused by storm Ida. However, that's not a new phenomenon: an original bridge was built in 1870 and flooded in 1871 prompting the County to have the covered bridge built in 1872. In 1959 it was repaired, and in 1999 it was repaired due to Hurricane Floyd. It was restored again in 2003 and has had a few repairs since including the recent one. The Gibson Bridge is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.





# Humphry Marshall—A Visionary this is the 4th in a series of articles detailing the life of

THIS IS THE 4TH IN A SERIES OF ARTICLES DETAILING THE LIFE OF WEST BRADFORD'S OWN HUMPHRY MARSHALL. BY: MARK SLOUF

My last article focused on Humphry Marshall's greatest achievement in Botany and Horticulture. But his other achievements, vision and humanitarianism put him in a class of his own.

One of Marshall's other pursuits was Astronomy. Having secured a state of the art telescope from his colleague Ben Franklin, in London at the time, Marshall made observations on sunspots which he forwarded to Franklin. Franklin then presented them to the Royal Society of London. The Royal Society comprised the world's most eminent scientists and, in Franklin's own words to Marshall, said "Your remarks on the sunspots in the sun were well received by the Royal

Society." In 1774 the completion of his house included a 2nd floor astronomical observatory, the first seen in Chester County.

As a philanthropist, Marshall helped found the Westtown Boarding School for youths and was known to prune its apple trees. He also played a role in the conception and planning of the County Alms House (Embreeville), in our own West Bradford, to accommodate the sick and poor.

Always a visionary and ahead of his time, Marshall advocated to Thomas Jefferson and Franklin the need for a Western expedition 18 years before Lewis and Clark. He advocated for reforestation to prevent runoff and erosion at a time when trees were considered a menace to development. For this reason, he has been called the Father of American Dendrology.

Humphry Marshall died Nov. 5, 1801 and lies buried in an unmarked grave at the Bradford Meeting burial ground. Humphry Marshall led a long fruitful life spanning his birth as an English colonist thru the war for independence and into America's growth on the cusp of the Industrial Revolution.

In a Proclamation made on April 19, 2022, the West Bradford Supervisors declared 2022 as the "Year of Humphry Marshall." Make sure to check out www.martinstavern.org/marshallton and our Fall Newsletter for this October 8th, 2022 event.



# The Night Shift

"Butterflies get our attention because they are active during the day, and most of them are brightly colored," says National Wildlife Federation Naturalist David Mizejewski. "But moths also are all around us, and they can be equally beautiful if we just take a closer look."

Moths, in fact, are far more abundant than butterflies. "For every species of butterfly on the planet, there are 19 species of moth," says University of Delaware entomologist Dr. Doug Tallamy.



Moths play vital roles in most of the

world's terrestrial ecosystems. Flying adult moths pollinate a large number and variety of plant species. When other insects go to sleep, moths work the night shift visiting some of the same flowers as diurnal pollinators and also night-blooming plants that daytime fliers miss. Voracious eaters, moth caterpillars return important nutrients to the soil through their feces. And moths are a significant source of food. "Due to their sheer numbers in the landscape, moths and their caterpillars provide a critical food resource for a vast number of wildlife species," Mizejewski says. But perhaps no wildlife relies more on moths for food than do birds during the breeding season. Contrary to what many people believe, "most birds do not reproduce on berries and seeds," Tallamy says. "Ninety-six percent of all terrestrial birds rear their offspring on insects, primarily the caterpillars of moths." Even birds that typically eat seeds will switch to insects when they are rearing chicks.

#### **HOW TO ATTRACT AND NURTURE MOTHS?**

You don't need a lot of space to attract an amazing diversity of moths to your garden.

#### **HERE ARE A FEW TIPS:**

- **Plant larval food.** Perhaps the most important way to attract and nurture moths is to provide host plants such as milkweed, asters, rue and parsley for the insects' caterpillars. Some species are particular and will feed only on one family or even a single species of plant. Caterpillars in the sphinx moth family, for example, require snowberry, viburnum or blueberry.
- Cultivate native nectar. When considering flowering plants for nectar, look for those with long tubular flowers. Night-blooming plants are important for some moth species. Be sure to grow a diversity of plants to ensure your yard offers continuous blooms from spring through autumn.
- **Be a lazy gardener.** In autumn, leave your leaves on the ground and dead vegetation standing. Both will

- shelter moth eggs, caterpillars, cocoons and adults during winter. If you must clean up, transfer leaves and other dead plant material to an unused corner of your yard or flower bed instead of bagging or shredding them.
- Add places to hide. Tree stumps, snags, fallen dead wood and brush piles are ideal locations for moths to overwinter, seek shelter from rain and hang their cocoons.
- **Avoid pesticides.** Insecticides kill moths directly while herbicides kill or contaminate host and nectar plants the insects need to survive.
- Turn off the lights. At night, switch off unnecessary outdoor lights, and use motion detector security lights. Moths that become trapped by light beams will waste valuable time that could be spent foraging or looking for mates.

# THE RETURN OF THE MARSHALTON TRIATHLON

After a two-year hiatus, the Marshalton Triathlon Festival is pleased to announce the return of the Marshalton Triathlon on



October 2, 2022. This year's Triathlon will pay tribute to the 300th anniversary of the birth of Humphry Marshall; the namesake of the village. The race course will identify three notable sites along its route associated with the life of Humphry Marshall–his birthplace (Derbydown), the home he built in Marshallton which is a national historic site, and his burial site in the Bradford Friends Meeting cemetery.

First run in 1973, the Marshalton Triathlon is considered one of the longest running triathlons in the country. Community members, families, and teams from Chester County and beyond gather in the village of Marshallton to pedal, paddle, and pace through the scenic and historic 10-mile route to help raise funds for the Triathlon's two beneficiaries–West Bradford Fire Company and the Marshallton Conservation Trust (MCT).

This year, in honor of Humphry Marshall's important legacy, MCT will designate any proceeds that it receives from the Triathlon to help fund the creation of the new Humphry Marshall Memorial Garden. The Garden will be located at the new nearby Embreeville Park, working in collaboration with West Bradford Township. The Humphry Marshall Memorial Garden will replicate, to the extent possible, the variety of plantings and tree selections that existed in Humphry Marshall's original botanic garden located at his home in Marshallton. As a living example of the historically significant botanical work done by Humphry Marshall, the Memorial Garden will help to preserve and promote the rich history that makes our Village so unique.

# And the Survey Says ... BY: LPSC SUSTAINABILITY SUBCOMMITTEE

Thank you to the WBT residents who took the January energy survey produced by our Land Preservation and Sustainability Committee. Your input will help inform WBT's energy planning moving forward. The survey had 424 respondents who noted the top benefits to making energy changes: money saved through efficiency, improved air and water quality, increased resilience to flooding and natural disasters, and improved public health.



Those who participated said effective strategies for encouraging people to make energy improvements would be to decrease installation costs, identify low-interest loans, and lower utility bills. Consider programs such as Solarize Southeastern PA, which estimates your solar potential and then helps locate possible discounts, and PECO's energy audit, which identifies household efficiencies. Many of you would like to switch to residential renewable sources: if installing your own renewables is not an option, please explore PAPowerSwitch.com for green suppliers. 76% of the 424 respondents are concerned or extremely concerned about climate change, while 16% are not concerned.

For transportation, most respondents want to drive an electric vehicle but are deterred by price. Understandably, most of you are not interested in biking or walking on our narrow—and increasingly congested—roads.

Open space topped the list of desired township actions since it means fewer cars, more trees, and better stormwater management. Most agreed that financial incentives would be a welcome government action, but many urge the township lead by example: renewables on township properties, EV charging stations, guidance with finding reliable contractors, and less mowing. WBT already leads via our township building's geothermal HVAC system; plus, renewable energy credits power our municipal electricity.
