Tired of Rising Heating a Cooling Costs?

GEOTHERMAL heating and cooling may be the answer. Geothermal systems have improved over the last number of years to be an efficient heating and cooling system for your home.

The Township has two large buildings that use geothermal systems for heating and cooling. I have used one in my home for over 12 years and am thrilled with the decision I made to install the system.

The basic part of the system is a closed loop system that is installed in the ground to take advantage of the approximate 54-degree constant ground temperature. The closed loop is environmentally safe and typically guaranteed for 50 years! That loop provides liquid to a compressor system (water furnace) that uses that liquid to produce either heating or cooling and also can be used to preheat your domestic hot water, for a lower water heating cost.

The higher initial installation cost, due to the ground loop, starts to see a payback immediately in lower energy costs, also there is no oil or gas costs and the concern for delivery of the fossil fuels.

These are a few of the benefits that I have seen in having a geothermal system in my home:

- NO use of fossil fuels.
- NO noise from an outside condenser that is part of air conditioning your home.
- NO fire in a furnace in the basement and no danger of carbon monoxide poisoning if there is a chimney failure.
- Lower energy costs to provide heating and air conditioning.
- More even heat and air conditioning as the geothermal system uses less variation in temperature between cycles.

- Cleaner home due to no burning of fossil fuels.
- No dependence on oil or gas delivery and the constant change in pricing.
- More space in the basement due to removal of the oil storage tank.
- Preheating of hot water for domestic use thereby causing additional savings from the cost of heating water for domestic use.
- Quiet operation of the system unlike the noise from the ignition of fossil fuel appliances.

If you have questions or need explanation of my experience with geothermal you can leave a question with Township staff to forward to me or contact your HVAC contractor who has had experience with the installation of geothermal systems. We must use systems like this to protect our environment and also see a benefit to our home budget! — -Jack M Hines, Chairman Board of Supervisors

Humphry Marshall

This is the second in a series of articles detailing the life of West Bradford's own Humphry Marshall. By: Mark Slouf


The Early Years

Humphry Marshall was born
October 10, 1722 in the Pennsylvania
wilderness. The 8th of 9 children, he
was the son of Abraham & Mary (Hunt)
Marshall, both Quakers. His father's
land, known as Derbydown, abutted
the last vestige of the Leni-Lenape
homeland. The area, then known as
"The Forks," would soon become West
Bradford Township.

One can only imagine, as a young boy growing up, that the natural world surrounding him, was his to absorb and create opportunities. As with most children in his time & place, the opportunity for education was limited. Humphry often stated that, "He never went to school a day after 12 years of age," and like most children, their time was spent laboring on the farm.

At 12 years of age, Humphry, who had been described as strong and robust, was apprenticed out as a stone mason, working in the summers in Lancaster and New Jersey. As we will see, these stone masonry skills would serve him well in the future. After several years, with Humphry's father's involvement with the ministry of the Friends, Humphry and his brothers took over the management of the family farm.

In 1748, Humphry married Sara Pennock and they resided with his parents. With Sara's encouragement, Humphry devoted much of his spare time to acquiring and studying books on natural history and the classics. One can envision Humphry studying late into the night by candlelight tucked in a niche at his father's house. During this time Humphry also heeded the call to public service, serving as County Assessor and later elected to County Treasurer. In 1764 Humphry erected a brick addition on his father's house of which he fired the bricks from his



own hand. He also constructed the first greenhouse in Chester County to further his appetite for the collection of rare plants, ornamental trees and shrubs and his interest in botany and horticulture which progressively became the focus of his life's work.

In 1767 he inherited a large portion of his father's estate and erected a gristmill (Marshall's Mill) on the West branch of the Brandywine. He is also known to have constructed two bridges and done road improvements, probably to better serve his mill.

At this point, Humphry was a little past the halfway point in his life. With his accomplishments, so far, he was a pillar of the community. But as we will see, his accomplishments will morph exponentially to where Humphry will attain International acclaim and correspond with the major figures of the time.

Next year, starting in June, in celebration of Humphry Marshall's 300th, there are events planned throughout the greater West Chester area, culminating on Oct. 8, 2022, Humphry Marshall Day at the Martin's Tavern/Humphry Marshall Historical Park as well as throughout Marshallton. Snowy Winter Roads



To make the roads as safe as possible in winter, long hours in very tough conditions are spent by our Road Crew. Please cooperate with them and appreciate the fact that they are doing their best to serve the community. No matter how severe a snow or ice storm is, our staff is working to give you the best condition of roads as possible and as quickly.

Our trucks salt, cinder, and plow over 125 lane miles of roads. We hire extra contractors and maintain stock piles of over 400 tons of anti-skid material. We stock extra parts for plows, salt spreaders, and truck chains. Despite our best efforts, we do have equipment breakdowns during snowstorms. This may delay work on certain routes. Please be patient.

Each operator has a specific route that includes high priority roads and lesser priority roads. Operators will cover their entire route with salt and anti-skid material. This helps to keep the snow and ice from freezing on the surface. After that they begin to plow their route. The intensity of the snowstorm determines how routes are completed. For minor storms, the entire route may be completed at once. However, if the storm intensifies, only priority routes (usually through roads) will be plowed. Cul-de-sacs and secondary roads will not be done until the main routes can be kept open. As the storm lightens, all roads will be opened. After all roads can be kept open, drivers complete their route by pushing snow back as far as

possible on the cartway and clearing the intersections. The success of our winter maintenance program depends on how much cooperation we receive from our citizens.

By following these guidelines during a snowstorm, you can assist us in keeping the roadways open...

- Don't park cars on a street during a snowstorm. Remove all vehicles from streets before the storm and keep them off until the streets are cleared. Having cars in the street not only delays the clearing of streets, but can result in the car owner receiving a fine and/or the car being towed.
- Wait until the roadway is cleared before shoveling your driveway, sidewalk and mailbox area. But if you must clear these areas sooner, please know Township trucks will likely throw snow back onto your property when plowing the road.
- Do not shovel snow into the roadway. Pushing snow from your driveway or sidewalk into the roadway creates a safety hazard and could cause an accident. Property owners may be held responsible for accident damages.
- Prepare your vehicle for winter driving. If you are too nervous about driving on snow and ice, don't drive! Share a ride with a neighbor or wait until the roadways are cleared before traveling.
- Check your mailbox. We are not responsible for mailbox damage unless we actually hit the mailbox

with a truck or plow blade. Heavy snow thrown from highway plows will break mailboxes and rotted posts and you are responsible for these repairs.

The Township does not plow private roadways, roadways not dedicated to the Township and most Stateowned roadways. Bradford Avenue, Brandywine Drive, Glenside Road (from Beacon Hill Road into Downingtown), Camp Linden Road, Marshallton-Thorndale Road, Northbrook Road, Romansville Road, Downingtown Pike (Route 322), Embreeville Road, Stargazers Road, West Strasburg Road and Route 162 (from W. Strasburg to the Township line) are maintained by the Commonwealth. Please contact the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation at (610) 436-2091 to report snow removal concerns at these roadways.

We thank you for continued patience and understanding while we work to keep our roads safe during the winter season.

If your property has a grinder pump, only four kinds of materials are permitted to be discharged into the sanitary sewer system...

- 1. Human waste & toilet paper
- 2. Food wastes processed through a garbage disposal unit (but not grease)
- 3. Water from sinks, tubs & dishwashers
- 4. Water from washing machines

All other materials can damage your grinder pump. This includes paint, adult wipes and baby wipes. Property owners are responsible for any damages caused by the discharge of prohibited materials.

KEYSTONE INSTALLS NEW EASY PAYMENT DROP BOX

Keystone Collections Group installed a drop box to help taxpayers make easy and timely payments on their tax bills. The box is located in front of the Chester County Intermediate Unit Building at 455 Boot Road, Downingtown, PA 19335. Residents can use the box to remit local tax returns, payments and related documents. All contents must be placed in an envelope with the taxpayer's name, address and phone number written on the front. Cash should never be placed in the box – payment must be made only by check or money order.

The new drop box provides an alternative for residents who are concerned about the new coronavirus DELTA variant and are trying to avoid personal contact when paying their tax bill.

Land Preservation and Sustainability Committee "LPSC" Update on the Broad Run and Shadyside Park Pollinator Gardens

As we wrap up the summer and fall and head into winter, the pollinator gardens are still at work. If you look close enough, you will see that there are still seeds remaining on many of the flowers. These seeds will provide nourishment for many birds who hang around our area for the winter. In addition, as the leaves and temperature drop, it might be tempting to forget about your pollinator garden until spring—but don't call it quits yet! While it may seem like the bees and other insects have vanished for the year, they actually haven't gone anywhere.

In the following months the Township Park gardens will remain as is and the tall grasses and stems from the plants will remain undisturbed so that pollinators (insects and birds) can continue to benefit from its nourishment and protection.

Although some butterfly species, most notably the Monarch, are well-known for migrating vast distances when the seasons change, most pollinators prefer to stay home and ride out the cold. So, as unlikely as it seems, you are currently surrounded by bees and butterflies—even though we cannot see them.

Most native bee species will spend the winter in the nests that their mothers provisioned within the garden. In fact, just like bears, many pollinators hibernate through the winter, and having the protective layers of debris from the plants will assist with this process.

So if you are curious, the gardens will not be mowed until late winter for the reasons noted above. Next year you will also notice a much larger number of flowers appearing since they have now cycled through a full year and have had a chance to germinate properly. In addition, next year the LPSC will be studying additional locations for these beautiful and useful gardens. Please keep in mind that no pollinator garden is too small; so think about planting one in your own yard now or early next year.
